National Eye Health Survey underway

Australia is one step closer to eliminating avoidable blindness and vision impairment following a Federal Government funding announcement for a National Eye Health Survey that will map the prevalence of eye conditions in Australia.

Vision Summits

In the lead up to the Federal Election, Vision 2020 Australia hosted two Vision Summits to facilitate discussion between the eye health and vision care sector. the Government and the Opposition.

National Framework Implementation Plan approved

Minister for Health, the Hon Peter Dutton, endorsed the National Framework Implementation Plan on 2 September 2014. The Plan's approval is a significant milestone in achieving a truly national plan to eliminate avoidable blindness and vision loss, and improve participation of people who are blind or vision impaired.

Trachoma funding boost

\$16.5 million in the Federal Budget was allocated to help tackle the blinding eye infection trachoma in Indigenous communities.

National Disability Insurance Scheme supports flow

Vision impaired and legally blind people now have access to individualised supports such as skills training and adaptive technology as a result of strong advocacy by Vision 2020 Australia and the sector.

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New aid framework

The Global Committee has taken every opportunity to position eye health and vision care within the Australian Government's new aid framework, demonstrating that preventing and treating avoidable vision loss reduces poverty and removes a known barrier to economic growth. Having responded to Parliamentary inquiries on performance benchmarks, the role of the private sector and gender rights, the signs are positive for the future of avoidable blindness initiatives in our region.

Minister supports Vision Initiative

Victorian Minister for Health, the Hon David Davis, launched the new Vision Initiative Pilot Projects, targeting Victorians at risk of eye conditions on World Sight Day 2013.

Parliamentarians attend sector event

World Sight Day success

The East Asia Vision Program Annual Report, published in May 2014, highlights the work of the Global Consortium in Cambodia, Timor-Leste and Vietnam, including the hundreds of training activities that have improved the skills of those working in eye health and vision care.

Our WORK

Vision 2020 Australia collaborates with members to improve eye health and vision care in Australia and our region. Our policy committees are formed around four pillars:

Prevention and early intervention

Our Prevention and Early Intervention Committee works to ensure eye disease prevention and early intervention is recognised as a health priority by the Australian Government.

The National Framework Implementation Plan has been endorsed and sets priorities for the Commonwealth that will focus efforts over the next two years, particularly on preventing eye disease related to diabetes and establishing a strong evidence base for frontline service provision with the National Eye Health Survey.



Independence and participation

Our Independence and Participation Committee provides a unified and consistent voice among members to ensure people who are blind or vision impaired have equitable access to supports and services to assist with living the life of their choosing.

The roll out of National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) trial sites this year saw people who are legally blind and people who are vision impaired receiving packages of supports. This is testament to the achievement of speaking with one voice and provides a strong foundation for the ongoing inclusion of people who are blind and vision impaired in the NDIS going forward.



Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander people


Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Committee provides a forum to strengthen partnerships among member organisations that are committed to eye health in Indigenous communities and to establish agreed policy on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander eye health and vision care.

The Committee's efforts in 2013-14 have resulted in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander eye health and vision care being included as one of only three key priorities under the National Framework Implementation Plan for the next two years. Actions will be informed by the *Roadmap to Close the Gap for Vision*, and an oversight function specific to Indigenous eye health and vision care is currently being discussed by a sub-committee under the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council.

Global

Our Global Committee was formed to ensure that the sector speaks with one strong voice in working to eliminate avoidable blindness and reducing the impact of vision loss in developing countries in our region.

During a time of immense change with the new Federal Government aid framework being released and implemented, the Global Committee has placed eye health and vision care in a strong position with the new Federal Government. The Committee has established a stronger relationship with Lions Australia, set out a strategy for exploring additional donor partnerships and aligned the new aid paradigm squarely with the Vision 2020 Australia Global Consortium.



Focus ON

Parliamentarians focus on eye health

A key advocacy initiative is our Parliamentary Friends Group. Established in 2007, this bi-partisan group is co-chaired by Coalition and Labor members of parliament and promotes eye health and vision care issues at the federal level.

The Parliamentary Friends Group gathered at Parliament House in Canberra in March 2014 to update parliamentarians on key eye health and vision care issues playing out across Australia.

A panel of speakers took to the stage, including: Optometry Australia's Kate Johnson, RANZCO's Dr Bradley Horsburgh, Indigenous Australian Alfred Bamblett and Blind Citizens Australia's Lauren Henley.

The event was a chance to hear stories from men and women working in eye health and vision care as well as people who have lived experience of blindness and vision impairment.

A new video *Our Eyes – Our Journey* was also launched at the event. The video seeks to

increase the number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people receiving eye health and vison care services across Australia.

The event was a great success with over 100 attendees including parliamentarians, advisers, government officials and representatives from the eye health and vision care sector.

Special guests included former Governor General Major General Michael Jeffery; Assistant Minister for Health, Senator the Hon Fiona Nash; Secretary of the Department of Health, Jane Halton; and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senator the Hon Brett Mason.





Support for eye health survey

Vision 2020 Australia was given the go ahead to facilitate Australia's first National Eye Health Survey in June 2014 when the Minister for Health, the Hon Peter Dutton, gave the survey a \$1.126 million Federal funding injection.

This funding, together with nearly \$1 million already raised through cash and in-kind contributions from the non-government and private sectors has enabled the survey to get underway.

Negotiated by Vision 2020 Australia, the national survey, which will be conducted by the Centre for Eye Research Australia, is long overdue and will provide an accurate, evidenced-based picture of nationwide eye health and map the prevalence of eye conditions across Australia.

As Australia's population ages the nation will see an increase in the number of people with age-related eye diseases and conditions, and being armed with accurate data will help tackle these conditions efficiently and effectively.

The survey will provide clear evidence of what the eye health issues are, the extent of the problem and where efforts need to be directed. Importantly, having hard evidence means frontline eye health services can be directed to where they are most needed.

Vision 2020 Australia thanks Brien Holden Vision Institute, Centre for Eye Research Australia, Design for Vision, Luxottica, Novartis, Optometry Australia and Zeiss for their invaluable contributions to the survey.

Sector approach to World Sight Day

World Sight Day is a key day on the calendar for Vision 2020 Australia and its members to advocate to government and raise awareness with a broader audience about the importance of eye health and vision care.

World Sight Day 2013 was held on 10 October and the annual day of awareness focussed on the call to action of 'Get your eyes tested'.

Vision 2020 Australia members were instrumental in supporting the initiative and conducted media activity, held events with their stakeholders and used social media to put eye health on the national agenda.

In addition, Vision 2020 Australia conducted its own media awareness campaign launching a new national Eye Health Report Card study which found that millions of Australians were still taking their sight for granted. The study secured hundreds of media hits and was an opportunity to encourage the general public to look after its eye health.

Program SNAPSHOT

Vision 2020 Australia is committed to raising awareness about eye health and vision care in Australia and the region. Working in collaboration with members and partners, our programs ensure blindness and vision loss prevention remains high on government agendas.

Pilot projects launched

The Vision Initiative is a health promotion program aimed at preventing avoidable blindness and addressing the impact of vision impairment in the Victorian community.

On World Sight Day 2013, the Victorian Minister for Health, the Hon David Davis, and Vision 2020 Australia launched new pilot programs to help Victorians save their sight.

The new pilot projects aim to bring health and eye health professionals together to identify those at risk of eye disease and vision loss and encourage them to have regular eye tests.

Four local government areas were targeted for the rollout of the projects–Darebin, Greater Geelong, Greater Shepparton, and Latrobe.





Global Consortium achieves results

The Vision 2020 Global Consortium is a partnership of six Australian eye health and vision care organisations working to eliminate avoidable blindness and vision loss in Asia and the Pacific.

The Global Consortium works in partnership with the Australian Government to eradicate avoidable blindness in Asia and the Pacific. It is effectively eliminating the duplication of services in the region with its collaborative approach, delivering successful provision of vital aid services.

The partnership is set to restore or improve the vision of as many as 100 million people in the region over the next decade.

By addressing eye health and vision care through targeting the vulnerable and most marginalised, lives can be transformed, particularly those of women and girls and people living with disability. Universal inclusion will lead to improved social, economic and lifestyle opportunities, helping break the cycle of poverty.

East Asia Vision Program results published

The East Asia Vision Program is a threeyear program (2013-15) funded by the Australian Government and implemented by the Vision 2020 Australia Global Consortium. It involves Consortium members working together with country partners in Cambodia, Timor-Leste and Vietnam to reduce avoidable blindness and vision loss.

Among the key regional results achieved by the Program to date are:

692 individual training activities were completed to improve the skills of those working in eye health.

12 people graduated with new specialist and general qualifications.

Training conducted on: the provision of eye care services to people with a disability; ensuring women have equal access to eye care; and making sure children are treated and cared for appropriately during service delivery.

Report of the Independent Auditor on the Summary Financial Statements For the Year Ended 30 June 2014

Report on the summarised financial report

The accompanying summary financial statements, which comprises the summary statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income and summary statement of financial position as at 30 June 2014, are derived from the audited financial report of Vision 2020 The Right to Sight Australia for the year ended 30 June 2014. We expressed an unmodified audit opinion on that financial report in our report dated 20 October 2014. That financial report, and the summary financial statements, do not reflect the effects of events that occurred subsequent to the date of our report on that financial report.

The summary financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements (including the Australian Accounting Interpretations) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. Reading the summary financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial report of Vision 2020 The Right to Sight Australia. The information reported in the summarised financial report is consistent with the annual statutory financial report from which it is derived and upon which we expressed an unqualified audit opinion in our report to the members. For a better understanding of the scope of our audit, this report should be read in conjunction with our audit report on the annual statutory financial report.

Directors' Responsibility for the Summary Financial Statements
